Custodial Options for Family Planning in Hawai'i

If you (the parent) live in Hawai'i and need someone else to have the authority to care for your child when you cannot be there, there are several options that are discussed below. When evaluating the options, you should consider how much of that authority you are willing to give to someone else (whether it be temporary or long term) and who would be the best caregiver for your child. Each option gives the caregiver different rights and responsibilities. Please note that these options do not guarantee that your child will be placed in the caregiver's care, but it is better to have protective documents in place to ensure someone you trust can care for your child if you cannot be present. You and your child's caregiver should keep copies of these documents. If the caregiver tries to do something on your child's behalf (e.g., enrolling in school), they should present copies of these documents. Here is a guide to help you understand your options:

Option 1: Caregiver Consent Affidavit for Schooling¹

When should this option be considered?

When you are unavailable for a temporary period of time and need another caregiver to only handle everyday school matters for your child. To be eligible for this option, your child must be residing with the caregiver.

What is it and what powers will it give the caregiver?

It is a sworn statement that allows a caregiver to enroll your child in school or extracurricular activities.

How does this option affect my parental rights and authority?

Your parental rights stay the same. This form does not grant the caregiver legal custody of your child.

Who needs to sign the form? Does it need to be notarized?

The caregiver signs. The parent should sign; however, if the caregiver cannot obtain the parent's signature, the caregiver must include a statement in the affidavit documenting the attempts to obtain the parent's signature. No notary signature is required.

How can parents and caregivers use the form?

Provide a copy to your child's schools. Keep a copy with you and give one to anyone else who needs to trust the caregiver's decisions.

For how long is the form valid?

This form is valid until (1) your child is no longer residing with the caregiver or (2) you cancel the form.

Can this option be canceled or changed by the parent?

Yes, you may cancel this option at any time by informing your child's school principal the form has been cancelled.

Are there any costs associated with this option?

No filing or notary fees.

Any other considerations?

Some schools or other institutions may not accept this form.

Option 2: Caregiver Consent Affidavit for Medical Care²

When should this option be considered?

When you are unavailable for a temporary period of time and need another caregiver to handle everyday health matters for your child. To be eligible for this option, the caregiver must be at least eighteen (18) years old and (i) the caregiver must be related by blood, marriage, or adoption to your child, or (ii) the caregiver must have resided with your child for the immediately preceding six months or more and must still be residing with your child.

What is it and what powers will it give the caregiver?

It is a sworn statement that allows a caregiver to make medical decisions for your child.

How does this option affect my parental rights and authority?

Your parental rights stay the same. This form does not grant the caregiver legal custody of your child.

Who needs to sign the form? Does it need to be notarized?

The caregiver signs. The parent should sign; however, if the caregiver cannot obtain the parent's signature, the caregiver must include a statement in the affidavit documenting the attempts to obtain the parent's signature. No notary signature is required.

How can parents and caregivers use the form?

Provide a copy to your child's doctors and other health care professionals. Keep a copy with you and give one to anyone else who needs to trust the caregiver's decisions.

For how long is the form valid?

The form is valid until (i) your child is no longer residing with the caregiver or (ii) you cancel the form.

Can this option be canceled or changed by the parent?

Yes, you may cancel this option at any time by informing your child's appropriate health care professional that the form has been cancelled.

Are there any costs associated with this option?

No filing or notary fees.

Any other considerations?

Some doctors or other health care professionals may not accept this form.

Option 3: Delegation of Power by Parent or Guardian³

When should this option be considered?

When you are unavailable for a temporary, but longer, period of time and need another caregiver to make decisions for your child. It offers the caregiver broader powers than a caregiver consent affidavit

What is it and what powers will it give the caregiver?

It is a notarized legal document that is used by parent to delegate certain power regarding the "care, custody, or property" of your child to a caregiver (except the power to consent to marriage or adoption) for a limited period of time (up to one (1) year),

How does this option affect my parental rights and authority?

Your parental rights stay the same. This form does not grant the caregiver legal custody of your child. It temporarily authorizes a caregiver to act for your child within the scope detailed in the form, but you may continue to make decisions at any time.

Who needs to sign the form? Does it need to be notarized?

The caregiver. At least one parent signs. A notary also signs. If only one legal parent signs, it does not affect the rights of the non-signing parent. Some schools, health professionals or agencies may ask for witness signatures.

How can parents and caregivers use the form?

Give copies to your child's school, doctor, health care professionals, and anyone else who needs proof of the caregiver's authority to make decisions. Keep extra copies in a safe place. There is no need to file it with the court.

For how long is the form valid?

Up to one (1) year, unless you write in a shorter term. It can be renewed.

Can this option be revoked or changed by the parent?

Yes, you can cancel it at any time in writing by signing a revocation of power of attorney, and telling everyone who has a copy.

Are there any costs associated with this option?

Yes, potential notarization fees.

Any other considerations?

Some schools or health care professionals may not accept this form.

Option 3: Guardianship⁴

When should this option be considered?

When you expect to be unavailable for a long period of time and need another caregiver to provide care for your children on an ongoing basis.

What is it and what powers will it give the caregiver?

It is a legal relationship established by a court in which a caregiver is given the authority to care for your child and make major and minor decisions regarding your child's welfare, education, health and general upbringing when you are unavailable to do so.

Guardianship can be granted for a set short period of time and an ongoing period of time, and can be narrowly tailored to the specific need of your child under the court order.

How does this option affect my parental rights and authority?

It suspends or limits your ability to make decisions for your child for the duration of the guardianship and shifts custody of your child to the caregiver. You should still be able to visit and communicate with your child as permitted by the court.

Who needs to sign the form? Does it need to be notarized?

A written petition must be filed by the caregiver in the family court in the circuit where your child lives, which is signed by the parent(s) if available. The caregiver must provide sufficient notice of the petition to the parent(s) and your child (if older than fourteen (14) years old). There will be a court hearing where the judge will review the petition and determine whether to grant guardianship.

How can parents and caregivers use the form?

After the judge signs the order, give certified copies to the school, health care professionals, insurance company and anyone else who needs proof. Keep the original court papers in a safe and secure place.

For how long is the form valid?

Until the date set by the judge in the order, and if no date is set, until your child turns eighteen (18) years old.

Can this option be revoked or changed by the parent?

Yes, you can petition the court to modify or terminate the guardianship if your circumstances change and you are able to resume care of your child. However, the court must approve your petition to terminate the guardianship.

Are there any costs associated with this option?

Yes, court fees and potential attorneys fees.

Any other considerations?

Because this is a court order, schools, healthcare professionals and other agencies must accept it.

The minor's parent or legal custodian may at any time rescind this affidavit by informing the minor's school principal in writing that the minor is attending school under the authority of this affidavit and that this affidavit has been rescinded.

A person who relies on this affidavit has no obligation to conduct any further inquiry or investigation. No person who relies in good faith on this affidavit shall be subject to civil or criminal liability or to professional disciplinary action because of that reliance.

Obtaining Birth Certificates¹⁰

Louisiana is a closed record state, meaning Louisiana birth certificates are not public records.

Who can order a birth certificate?

- A certified copy of a birth certificate is issued only to an applicant who has a direct and tangible interest in the record. The following persons are considered to have such an interest:
 - The registrant (the person whom the record is concerned with).
 - The registrant's spouse.
 - The registrant's parents.
 - A descendant of the registrant (e.g. child or grandchild).
 - A person who has a common ancestor with the registrant (e.g., a sibling, grandparent, aunt/uncle, or cousin).
 - A legal guardian of the registrant.
 - A person or agency acting on behalf of the registrant.
 - A personal representative of the registrant's estate.
 - A person whose right to obtain a copy of the record is established by an order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

Where can you obtain a birth certificate?

- Online Order (Fast/Highly Recommended):
 - Complete the order form at <https://vitrec.ehawaii.gov/vitalrecords/>.
 - Have a government issued identification (I.D.), (such as a State Driver License, State Identification, or Passport) ready for upload.
 - Accepts only payment by debit or credit cards.

- Each additional copy: \$4.00
- General Administration Fee (for up to 5 copies): \$2.50 (add another \$2.50 fee for each additional increment up to 5 copies)
